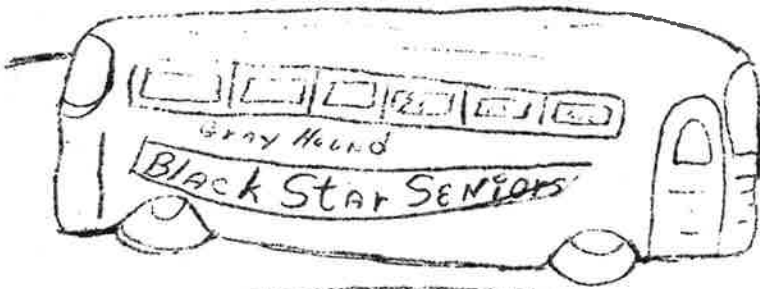

THE PRINCIPAL SPEAKS---

Of Human Rights and Property Rights

Our basic law is founded on two thesis primarily-human rights and property rights. Of the two, property rights is older.

All matter, material, and substance, with the exception of human beings in certain parts of the world, may be considered as property. Within the boundaries of all modern countries, all property is owned either by an individual or a government agency. We, therefore, have two types of property-private and public.

The ownership of property began long before the recording of history. A cave man owned a very effective club. He found or shaped it. It was most effective for defending his family and for obtaining food. He would personally punish or attempt to punish anyone depriving him of his weapon. The sacredness of property grew with the individual, family, clan, tribe, and the organized government.

Today we have laws which pro-

hibits the damaging or destruction of property. We begin with the baby teaching respect for property. He is taught not to break, destroy, or otherwise misuse property. A book is a child's friend. Through it he can travel around the world; he can relive the experiences of George Washington or the Bobbsey Twins; or sneak through the forests with James Fenimore Cooper. The pane of glass he breaks in the school house deprives him of a good book, map, globe, film-strip movie or many other things which he might enjoy at school. The glass broken from the private home deprives the owner of possibly some family necessity. Certainly it is a waste of both human and natural resources.

We must respect both private and public property. We are duty-bound to do so.

I think Peggy W. and Linda Jane B. try a little too hard. Slow down girls and make the boys run awhile.

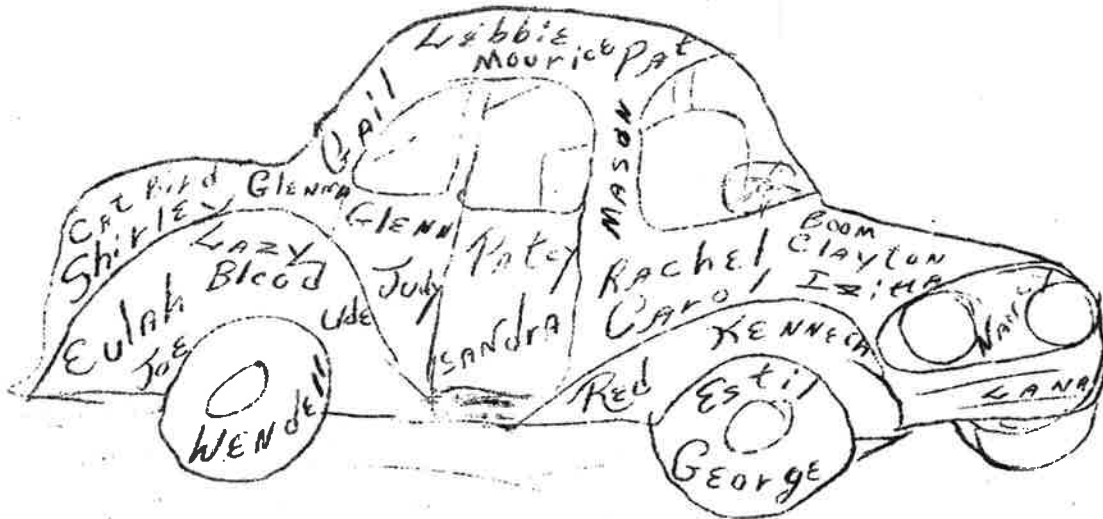
Oh! that lucky Barbara Cox from Balkan. Clayton H., why don't you give a few of our girls a chance.
